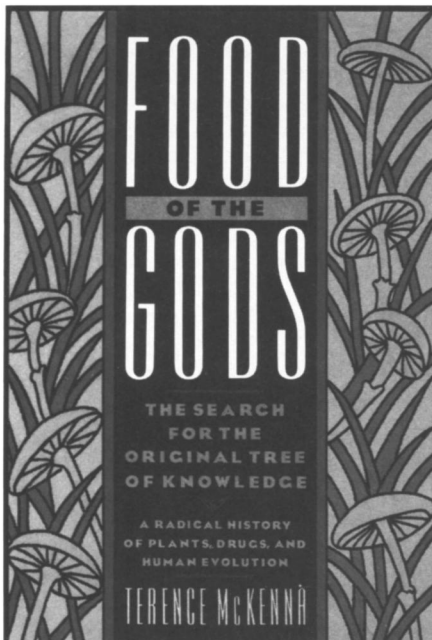

Why, as a species, are humans so fascinated by altered states of consciousness? How have altered states affected our esthetics and our spiritual practices? Can altered states reveal something to us about our origins as human beings and our place in nature?

More than twenty years ago, McKenna first encountered the visionary, ecstatic journeys of African tribes, Native Americans of the Southwest, and the peoples of

the steamy interiors of South America's jungles. *Food of the Gods* is the startling, unexpected story of his discoveries. It provides a convincing “missing link” to explain humankind's development of language, superior intelligence, and culture, and a doorway to the divine.

McKenna illustrates the basis of our human desire for the “food of the gods” and the powerful potential to replace maladaptive modern abuse of illegal drugs with a shamanic understanding and its insistence on community, reverence for nature, and increased self-awareness.

Food of the Gods ends with a master plan for seriously seeking to come to terms with America's drug problems. The book examines why the “pursuit of happiness” is illegal if it involves plants found in nature and addresses the continuing current furor over legalizing drugs.

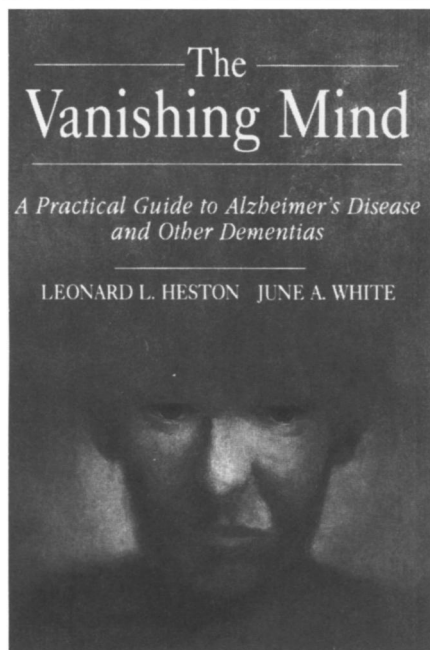

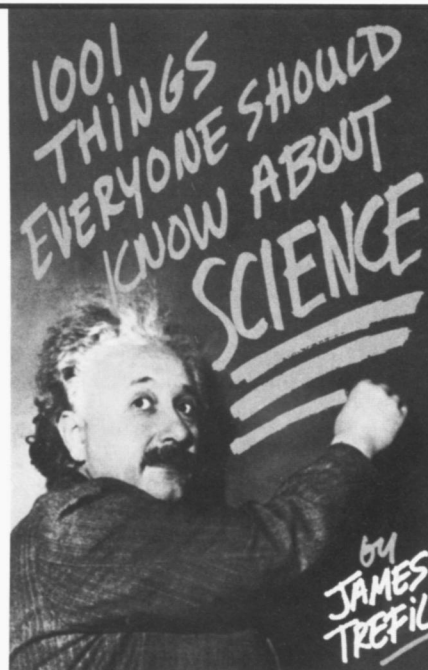
