

These first three volumes of a landmark, five-volume series from the American Museum of Natural History entitled **The Illustrated History of Humankind** reveal the epic history of human evolution over four million years through the groundbreaking work of the world's most distinguished experts.

Each beautifully designed volume contains more than 300 full-color photographs and pictorial spreads, and dozens of vivid illustrations, diagrams, and artists' reconstructions that illuminate the questions that eternally fascinate and inspire: Who are we? Where did we come from? When and how did we develop villages, towns, and cities? Why did societies develop differently in diverse parts of the world? How did technologies and social organizations come to exist? What did early peoples believe?

Volume one, **The First Humans**, takes the human story to 10,000 B.C., exploring our earliest origins and examining theories of evolution, the Great Apes, the origins of language, dating the past, extinct species, and the global expansion that precipitated remarkable adaptation and diversity. Included in this volume is David Hurst Thomas, Curator of Anthropology at the American Museum of Natural History, discussing the first Americans.

Global in its scope, Volume two, **People of the Stone Age**, introduces the latest archaeological findings—and their modern-day implications: In our age of global warming, what can we learn from the way our ancestors adapted to Late Pleistocene climatic upheaval? What will DNA studies of the Ice Man of the Tyrol—the oldest preserved human body ever found—tell us about life in the Late Neolithic Period and about ourselves?

Volume three, **Old World Civilizations** traces the development of the first urban societies in Mesopotamia—the birthplace of writing, legal codes, the wheel, metallurgy, and mathematics; the political and religious traditions of the ancient Egyptians; the first cities of South Asia; the dynasties of China that have come to be known as the fountainhead of Chinese culture; the political communities of Africa; Iron Age Europe; the vast and mighty Roman Empire; ancient Greece and its legacies—from columnar architecture to the concept of democracy; and much more.
