Volume one, The First Humans, takes the human story to 10,000 B.C., exploring our earliest origins and examining theories of evolution, the Great Apes, the origins of language, extinct species, and the global expansion that precipitated remarkable adaptation and diversity.

Global in its scope, volume two, People of the Stone Age introduces the latest archaeological findings - and their modern-day implications: In our age of global warming, what can we learn from the way our ancestors adapted to Late Pleistocene climatic upheaval? What will DNA studies of the Ice Man of the Tyrol tell us about life in the Late Neolithic Period and about ourselves?

Volume three, Old World Civilizations traces the development of the first urban societies in Mesopotamia — the birthplace of writing, the wheel, metallurgy, and mathematics; the political and religious traditions of the ancient Egyptians; the first cities of South Asia; the dynasties of China; the political communities of Africa; and Iron Age Europe.

The fourth volume, entitled New World and Pacific Civilizations. reveals the ancient wonders of the "New World" and Pacific islandsincluding the civilizations of the Maya, Aztecs, and Inca; Native North Americans from prehistoric times through A.D. 1850; and the unique development of Japanese culture.

Through the living voices of Australian Aborigines, Arctic survivors, North American Indians, and others, Traditional Peoples Today, volume five, explores the fate of traditional cultures in the era of global communication and reveals history in the making in the modern world.
