

"Assume the cow is a sphere." So begins this lively, irreverent, and informative look at physics and how physicists think. Rich with anecdotes and accessible examples (like the cow as sphere, which illustrates the principle of simplifying the world in order to explain it). Fear of Physics nimbly ranges over the tools and thought behind the scientific method, taking the mystery out of what is essentially a very human intellectual endeavor.

In six fun-filled chapters that include a discussion of the ideas and tricks of everyone from Plato to Marshall McLuhan to Stephen Hawking, Krauss brings his enormous talents as a master teacher to this subject. Among the topics he treats are how to handle the "art" of numbers, how physicists define truth, how and when to plagiarize creatively, and much more.

ore than 600,000 hysterectomies are performed each year in the United States. Fewer than 10 percent of them, says Dr. Stanley West, are necessary.

West's straight talk and unequivocal position are unique, even in a field of books on the subject. He believes—and states in no uncertain terms—that virtually *no* hysterectomy is *ever* necessary except when a women has cancer. In any other circumstance, he says, the operation presents unacceptable risks and will likely do more harm than good. Clearly and carefully he describes the alternative, preferred treatments that are always available to every woman, no matter what her age.

Stanley West speaks out boldly against his medical colleagues for taking "the easy way out," and explains how insurance companies contribute to and encourage the high hysterectomy rate. Most importantly, however, he educates women about how their bodies work and explains why they should challenge their doctors. It is his mission to empower women to take control of their health care, to insist upon a dialogue with their doctors, and to demand the kind of treatment they deserve.
