

o early human relative has triggered more scientific debate or more strongly captured our imagination than Neanderthal Man. Why, after brilliantly surviving several severe Ice Age glaciations to thrive for 200,000 years—twice as long as modern humans have been on Earth—did Neanderthals all of a sudden drop out of sight? That they disappeared astonishingly recently—less than 30,000 years ago, just when early *Homo sapiens* were appearing in Europe—makes the mystery even more tantalizing.

Scientists have long known that the popular image of the Neanderthal as a primitive, hairy, heavily browed, club-wielding brute is not supported by the fossil evidence. But to date, no such consensus has existed on the riddle of Neanderthals' disappearance. Did they interbreed with our direct ancestors, so that we see Neanderthal traits in our populations today? Or were they wiped out in some sort of prehistoric battle-of-the-species when a more advanced group—our

direct ancestors—appeared on the scene?

Tattersall's vivid account brings the Neanderthals


