In Good Food for Bad Stomachs, Henry Janowitz, author of *Your Gut Feelings* and *Indigestion*, provides a thorough guide to healthful eating, one tailored especially for those who suffer from—or have a family history of—gastrointestinal disorders.

Beginning with the elements of a realistic, reasonable diet, Janowitz suggests that most of us need to increase our intake of fiber dramatically (up to 30 grams or more a day). We should also lower our consumption of fat, avoid obesity at all costs, reduce our reliance on caffeine, alcohol, and tobacco, and supplement our daily diet with vitamins.


Janowitz examines gastrointestinal disorders one by one, covering esophagitis and swallowing disorders and cancer of the colon and rectum, describing symptoms and causes, recommending food we should eat to avoid the disorder, and outlining both dietary and medical approaches to treatment. He talks about inflammation and ulcers of the stomach and duodenum, peptic ulcers, gastritis, gallstones, pancreatitis and liver diseases; discusses food allergies and intolerance and dietary problems associated with aging; deals with such pedestrian complaints as intestinal gas, traveler's diarrhea, and constipation; and gives special attention to the inflammatory bowel diseases, including ulcerative colitis and Crohn's disease, on which he is a renowned expert.


