

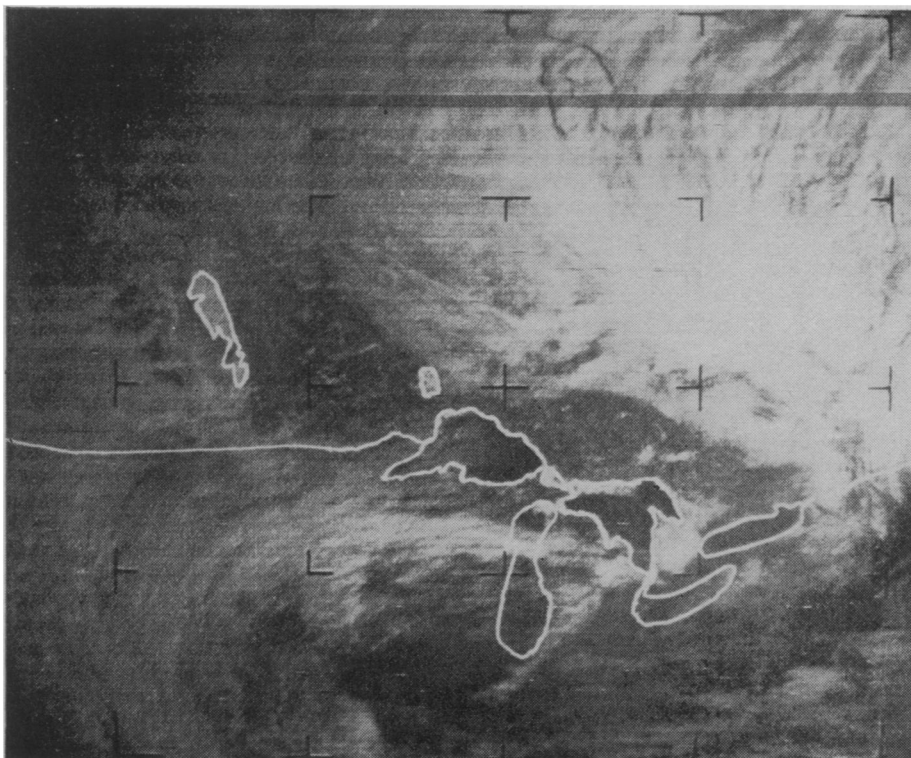
From the Editor
