DISPOSABLE PIPETTES made of borosilicate glass are discarded after use, thus providing freedom from contamination. Especially useful for critical procedures and when handling infectious materials, the highly trans-parent serological pipettes are cottonplugged and packaged in sterile poly-ethylene bags. They come in one-mil-limeter size with 1/100 ml. gradua-tions in easily readable dark blue, and are heat resistant and chemically inert. Science News, 89:430 May 28, 1966

& LONG-LASTING **FERTILIZER** packets provide controlled feeding of plants for five years. The fertilizer packet is placed in soil near new plants, established trees, shrubs or bushes. Tiny pores in the packet release nutrients in the spring and summer. Safe to use, this method of feeding plants eliminates the need to refertilize each year.

FOUR-WAY CLIPS are designed for attaching tubing or wiring firm-ly to any structural surface. No holes need to be drilled to apply the unit which is mounted with adhesive.

It will hold up to 35 pounds or 35 cans of food or liquid.

Doctors Are Reading

Stuttering Feigned by Therapist

➤ A VOICE therapist at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., helps stuttering children speak more fluently by deliberately producing stuttering sounds, which he himself

The children themselves are encouraged to reproduce a particular type of stuttering so they can be helped to control and modify it.

Dr. Hugh H. Gregory produces a common bond with the children, aged six to 10, who are difficult to teach by other methods. Together the teacher and students analyze his feigned speech problem, and the students learn to make their speech mechanism do what they want it to do.

Dr. Gregory has used the method with about 50 children since 1960, most of whom have shown considerable improvement in their speech. His work was reported in Modern Medicine, 34:53, 1966.

TB, Alcoholism in Same Persons

➤ A GOOD REASON for not committing alcoholics to jail is that large numbers of them have tuberculosis and could infect other prisoners. Alcoholism itself is an illness that should not be punished by jailing, authorities say.

More than 80% of alcoholic inmates of the Don Jail,

Toronto, Canada, were found to have positive tuberculin tests as compared with 33.3% of other offenders tested, two Toronto investigators reported in the Canadian Medical Association Journal 94:999, 1966.

Of 227 chronic drunkenness offenders in one study, 20 gave a history of active TB. Reports from other centers show that tuberculosis and alcoholism frequently co-exist, particularly among the homeless men of skid row. The low standard of living associated with poor nutrition probably lowers resistance to infection.

Drs. Jack S. Olin and Stefan Grzybowski, who reported the study, suggested a special treatment center and an outpatient clinic where both diseases can be treated.

OK Expected for Gout Remedy

➤ A VALUABLE new drug for treating gout called allopurinol is expected to be cleared by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration soon. The investigational drug, which was tried on 55 patients at Duke University Hospital for periods up to 34 months, is reported in the Arthritis Foundation's Bulletin on Rheumatic Diseases, 16:400, 1966.

Dr. R. Wayne Rundles of the Duke University School of Medicine, Durham, N.C., with Dr. George H. Hitchings and Gertrude Elion, the Burroughs, Wellcome & Co. chemists who synthesized the drug, say allowant is beneficial to those who have not responded to other treatment. Allopurinol appears to affect the underlying enzymatic mechanism of gout.
