**LETTERS****to the editor****Uric acid and glucose**

Sir:

In the article "Rat Arthritis Calmed by Diabetes" (SN: 5/18, p. 477), the assumption is foreworded that diabetes might reduce an arthritic inflammation by interfering with glucose metabolism and inhibiting cellular activity.

In the case of gouty arthritis, the articular inflammation is usually accompanied by an elevation of the serum uric acid level. One way of treating this condition is to give agents to the patient that will enhance the rate of excretion of uric acid. One of the agents having this uricosuric effect is glucose.

It has been observed for many years that ingestion of a high carbohydrate diet or glucose infusion has the effect of reducing serum uric acid by enhancing its excretion through the kidney. In view of this, the alleviation of chronic arthritis in rats via induced diabetes may be a result of the elevation of blood glucose on the excretion of uric acid, rather than an alteration in glucose metabolism.
