The film seeks to emphasize the disparate but closely linked aspects of archaeology; its unique potential for adding to our knowledge of the relationships between man's products and his behavior; the theoretical formulations that are tested by research in the field; and the exciting moments of discovery. FLIGHTS INTO YESTERDAY: The Story of Aerial Archaeology—Leo Deuel, preface by Glyn Daniel—St. Martin's, 1969, 332 p., plates, illus., maps, \$8.95. A highly readable account of the pioneers of this valuable new tool of archaeological research—aerial reconnaissance and the interpretation of air photographs in the discovery of ancient tombs, road nets, lost medieval villages, buried ceremonial centers, giant sand drawings and underwater features.

THE GRAND COLORADO: The Story of a River and its Canyons—T. H. Watkins and others, foreword by Wallace Stegner—Am. West Pub. Co., 1969, 310 p., color plates by Philip Hyde, photographs, maps, \$15; until 12/31/69, \$12.95. Presents a profile of the river, the myths and early contacts, the exploration of the canyons, the dam builders, and the legacy of natural grandeur.

TONGUES OF CONSCIENCE: Weapons Research and the Scientists' Dilemma—R. W. Reid—Walker, 1969, 352 p., \$7.50. After a survey of the inventions that advanced the methods of warfare in the past 100 years, the book goes on to the involvement of modern science with international warfare and politics.

MANUAL ON WATER—J. F. Wilkes, Ed.—Am. Soc. for Testing Materials, 1969, 3rd ed., 360 p., illus., \$16.50. Upto-date manual intended as a brief reference source for plant designers, individuals engaged in industrial operations using water, analysis, engineers and consultants.

THE NADER REPORT on the Federal Trade Commission—Edward F. Cox, Robert C. Fellmeth and John E. Schulz; preface by Ralph Nader—Baron, R. W. (Dutton), 1969, 241 p., \$5.95. Report by a law student task force investigating the consumer-protection enforcement procedures of the FTC.

THE NEW DICTIONARY & HAND-BOOK OF AEROSPACE with Special Sections on the Moon and Lunar Flight—Robert W. Marks, Ed.—Praeger, 1969, 531 p., illus., charts, \$10. Defines and cross-references more than 50,000 aerospace terms, from "ablation" to "Zurich number."

THE NIGHT OF THE GRIZZLIES—Jack Olsen—Putnam, 1969, 254 p., photographs, \$6.95. About the grizzlies in Glacier National Park, the rangers' job, summer campers and the tragic events of the night in August 1967 when the grizzlies attacked and fatally mauled two campers.

NORTH AMERICAN BIRDS — Lorus and Margery Milne—Prentice-Hall, 1969, 340 p., 300 full-color plaintings by Marie Nonnast Bohlen, \$25. Portfolio depicts and describes more than 300 species,

grouped and discussed in relation to habitat. Includes chapters on migration, the history of bird studies, and conservation.

THE OPPENHEIMER CASE: Security on Trial—Philip M. Stern with Harold P. Green, special commentary by Lloyd K. Garrison—Harper, 1969, 591 p., \$10. A full-scale account of the historic case, highlighting the security system's procedures, the legal framework, and the political, historical and personality aspects of the case.

PHYSICAL CONTROL OF THE MIND: Toward a Psychocivilized Society—Jose M. R. Delgado, M.D.—Harper, 1969, 280 p., photographs, \$7.95. Describes the pioneer work in implanting electrodes in the brains of cats and monkeys, and deals with the clinical and ethical implications of the electrical stimulation of the brain in man.

THE PLEASURE SEEKERS: The Drug Crisis, Youth and Society—Joel Fort, M.D.—Bobbs-Merrill, 1969, 255 p., \$6.50. Describes the various types of mind-altering drugs, their use and abuse, their effects on individuals and on society.

THE POLITICS OF WEAPONS INNO-VATION: The Thor-Jupiter Controversy — Michael H. Armacost — Columbia Univ. Press, 1969, 304 p., \$10. This study of the IRBM controversy offers an analysis of inter-service competition as it affects the political process by which strategic weapons are developed, produced and deployed.

THE SACRED GROVE: Essays on Museums—Dillon Ripley—Simon & Schuster, 1969, 159 p., \$5. The Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution delineates his views of what museums are and how they happened, from the Stone Age man's collecting instinct to the present and future concept of the museum as a possible laboratory for study.

A guided tour by a former inhabitant of Siberia, revisiting and talking with the people in such cities as the planned science city of Akademgorodok, the diamond center of Mirny, among the Yakutsks and the natives of Kamchatka.
