

#### Sonic boom: con

As a psychiatrist, I am deeply concerned about the threat to the quality of our daily living implicit in the supersonic transport and the sonic boom that it will generate (SN: 7/29).

We know that the "startle reaction" caused by a sudden loud noise is a convulsion-like response of the newborn infant. The response of older children and adults to a comparable sudden boom has within it the seeds of this convulsive-like response that the small infant exhibits. We know that the startle reaction accelerates the heart beat, raises the blood pressure, dilates the pupils, dries the tongue and mouth, produces sweating of the palms and soles of the feet, in short, produces an alarm reaction to a stimulus which actually contains no threat to survival.

This type of response oft repeated can subject the frail cerebral and coronary vessels of the elderly and the infirm to traumatic shocks of such intensity that they may well die.

The repeated sound shocks on normal people would naturally vary in the type of neurotic response they would eventually produce. Different individuals would react differently to recurrent sound shocks of this intensity. We may be sure, however, that the emotionally unstable and the insane may well react

with responses of increasing severity that we shall be unable to control since the stimulus will continue relentlessly day-in and day-out "even to the edge of doom."

How much farther are we going to allow this toxic invasion of our living space by machines that do nothing to improve the quality of human living? It is incumbent upon all of us to do everything in our power to attempt to restore to mankind some of the peace and serenity that he had 100 years ago.

## Nature Note

### **Papyrus**

Along the banks of streams and shores of lakes, in the marshy areas of the Middle East, grows a graceful grass-like plant that is now nearly extinct.

Few plants have better served mankind than this Cyperus papyrus, a member of the sedge family, Cyperaceae—for upon its stripped pressed stems were written valuable notes and books, as well as prosaic accounts of taxes and land sales, and miscellaneous everyday items of people living thousands of years ago around the Mediterranean. Today scraps of these writings are eagerly sought as clues to ancient civilizations.

Yet today the live plant is considered merely a weed. The narrowleafed herb with fibrous roots, triangular shaped stems and small spiked flowers is often mistaken for grass, but has different characteristics—one of them being that the stems and leaves are dry and contain a lot of silica, and the edges are exceedingly sharp. It cannot even be used as fodder. The ancient Egyptians, however, found many uses for this plant. Garlands for shrines of the gods were made of the flowers. The woody root was fashioned into utensils or used for fuel; and from the stem came light-weight skiffs, sails, mats, cloth, cords-and most important, writing material. The tall stem was cut into longitudinal strips which were laid side by side and crossed by another layer of strips, then woven into a sheet which was soaked in the water of the Nile. After this the sheet was hammered and dried in the sun, then smoothed with ivory or a shell. Several sheets were joined together to form scrolls-the chief writing material of the Mediterranean civilizations until the 8th or 9th centuries, when papyrus began to be replaced by paper which also stole its name. Egyptians used papyrus some 29 centuries ago, and Greeks 4 or 5 centuries later.

Interest in papyrology—as the deciphering, transcribing and translating of papyrus writings is called—is kept alive today by a few devoted scholars. In the United States there are probably fewer than 10 active papyrologists, only one or two of them working full time, according to Prof. John Arthur Hanson, coordinator of an Institute in Papyrology which has held two summer sessions at Princeton University, drawing students from all parts of the United States to learn more about the tiny scraps of brown materials, often tattered and crumbling.
