THE CIRCLE OF FIRE: The Great Chain of Volcanoes and Earth Faults—Carl Heintze—Meredith Press, 1968, 161 p., photographs, diagrams, maps, \$3.95. Tells the story of the most active seismic region of the world, the volcanoes and earthquakes of the Pacific.

THE CRIME OF PUNISHMENT—Karl Menninger—Viking Press, 1968, 305 p., \$8.95. Psychiatrist analyzes the general ignorance of what constitutes crime, and the inadequacy of the penal system in dealing with individuals that get caught; he shows why the system fails to protect society and offers some rational proposals for improving the system.

EUGENICS AND THE PROGRESSIVES—Donald K. Pickens—Vanderbilt Univ. Press, 1968, 260 p., \$7.95. Examines the rise and fall of the eugenists, especially during the first three decades of this century, and views from the historical perspective the response of the progressives to the advances in genetics and other developments that destroyed the naturalism which created Galtonian eugenics.

EXPERIENCE AND BEHAVIOUR—Peter Mc-Kellar—Penguin Bks., 1968, 423 p., diagrams, pa-per, \$1.75. A survey of the state of psychology today, addressed to the general reader.

EXPLORING SPACE WITH A CAMERA—Edgar M. Cortright, Ed.—NASA (GPO), 1908, 214 p., photographs, many in color, \$4.25. Handsome volume, discusses atmosphere, clouds and air disturbances, moon views from orbit, moon maps, views of Mars, and detailed description of the most outstanding photographs of earth from space. Selection of unique photographs should make this record of U.S. space exploration a welcome gift book.

GALAPAGOS: ISLAND OF BIRDS—Bryan Neison, foreword by The Duke of Edinburgh—Morrow, 1968, 338 p., 57 photographs by author, 60 drawings by John Busby and author, map, 87,95. Combines readability and scientifically accurate nature study in a series of seabird portraits based on close observation of behavior and ecology during a year spent on two uninhabited islands.

THE GEOLOGY OF NEW YORK CITY AND ENVIRONS—Christopher J. Schuberth—Natural Hist. Press, 1968, 304 p., illus., maps, \$6.95. An illustrated guide to the geologic evolution of the metropolitan area, including detailed itineraries of regional field trips. metropolitan area, incof regional field trips.

THE GOLDEN WEB: A History of Broadcasting in the United States, Vol. II: 1933 to 1953—Erik Barnouw—Oxford Univ. Press, 1968, 391 p., photographs, \$9. In this continuing definitive history of American broadcasting, the author deals with the expansion period of the giant countrywide networks and the personalities connected with them.

GROWTH OF THE NERVOUS SYSTEM—G. E. W. Wolstenholme and Maeve O'Connor, Eds.—Little, Brown, 1968, 295 p., micrographs, diagrams, \$12. Proceedings of the 1967 Ciba Foundation Symposium, dealing with development of movement, biological aspects of NGF, and trophic interaction, peripheral and central.

INFRARED ASTRONOMY—Peter J. Brancazio and A. G. W. Cameron, Eds.—Gordon & Breach, 1968, 248 p., diagrams, \$15. Conference papers presenting reports on interstellar extinction in the infrared, spectra of cool stars, protostars, emission of line objects and other related topics.

AN INTRODUCTION TO THE PHILOSOPHY OF SCIENCE—D. W. Theobald — Methuen (Barnes & Noble), 1968, 145 p., \$5; paper, \$1.75. Presents science as an evolving language-system, developing a thesis that allows the reader to see how he can progress from experience to knowledge.

Written from a physicist's point of view, presents the reaction of the retina when its light-sensitive cells absorb light of various wave-lengths, the relays through which the nerve message reaches the visual centers of the brain and gives rise to a sensation of light and color. of light and color.

Reviews the experimental and clinical progress in general, personalities in the headlines, reviews medicine abroad, and advances in the various specialties, from allergy to urology.

TREES FOR ARCHITECTURE AND THE LANDSCAPE—Robert L. Zion—Reinhold, 1968, 284 p., 12 color plates, photographs by Maude Dorr and others, drawings, \$25. Shows winter and summer portraits of trees, discusses the practical considerations of location and planting, design use of individual trees, and includes state tree lists.

TRENDS AND VARIATIONS IN FERTILITY IN THE UNITED STATES—Clyde V. K.ser, Wilson H. Grabill and Arthur A. Campbell—Harvard Univ. Press, 1968, 338 p., \$6.95.
