This account of prehistoric art in Europe starts around 30,000 B.C., and ends with the Roman occupation of much of Europe. Besides the great masterpieces of cave painting, the less well-known, in part earlier, sculpture is presented in great variety, showing that Europe until about 10,000 B.C. appears to have been in advance of the rest of the world.

A PSYCHOLOGIST LOOKS AT MARRIAGE—Samuel Tenenbaum— A. S. Barnes, 1968, 405 p., \$6.95. Psychologist with private practice in psychotherapy shares many case histories designed to show what happens when middle class people, leading normal lives, encounter difficulties in their marriage, and how some of these problems were resolved.



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
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
