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THE AMERICAN FIGHTING MAN—Victor Hicken—Macmillan, 1969, 496 p., photographs, \$8.95. A historical survey and analysis of the essential qualities of American soldiers, sailors and marines, from the Revolution to the war in Vietnam.

AMERICA'S FIRST CIVILIZATION: Discovering the Olmec—Michael D. Coe; Richard B. Woodbury, Consultant—Am. Heritage/Smithsonian Inst. (Van Nostrand), 1968, 160 p., color plates, photographs, drawings, \$4.95. A popular account of the earliest and one of the greatest cultures of the New World, based on recent archaeological research. archaeological research.

ANNUAL PROGRESS IN CHILD PSYCHIA-TRY AND CHILD DEVELOPMENT, 1968— Stella Chess and Alexander Thomas, Eds.— Brunner/Mazel Pubs., 1969, 565 p., illus., \$15. Selection of the year's outstanding contributions to the understanding and treatment of the normal and disturbed child.

BANKERS, BONES AND BEETLES: The First Century of the American Museum of Natural History—Geoffrey Hellman—Natural Hist. Press, 1969, 275 p., 18 plates, \$5.95. A wittily written book, giving the anecdotal history of the remarkable men who have been associated with the founding and growth of a great natural history museum.

BIRD SONG: Acoustics and Physiology—Crawford H. Greenewalt—Smithsonian Institution Press (Random House), 1968, 194 p., illus., \$12.50. Scholarly monograph outlines in past theories about bird song, and, based on experiments with modern electronic equipment, demonstrates that the physiology and acoustics of bird vocalization are unique in the animal kingdom.

CADDIS LARVAE: Larvae of the British Tri-choptera—Norman E. Hickin—Fairleigh Dickin-son Univ. Press, 1969, 480 p., illus., \$20. De-scribes and illustrates the immature stage of the British caddis flies, including some new informa-tion on the adult flight period.

COLOR AND RACE: Vol. 13 of Daedalus Library—John Hope Franklin, Ed.—Houghton Mifflin, 1969, 391 p., \$6.95. Essays by psychologists, historians and sociologists from nine courties assess the cultural, psychological, physical and political forces that have brought about the widely distributed prejudice based on color.

ENZYMES: The Agents of Life—David N. Locke—Crown Pubs., 1969, 247 p., diagrams, \$5.95. Addressing the layman, the book describes the use of enzymes in health and disease, their role in medicine, industry and nutrition, including the history of their discovery and the findings of recent research.

EVALUATIVE RESEARCH: Principles and Practice in Public Service & Social Action Programs

—Edward A. Suchman—Russell Sage Founda-

tion, 1967, 186 p., \$6.50. Contributions to social science research and its uses in the realm of practical affairs, concerned with evaluative research design, evaluation of program administration and evaluation models for social experiment.

FAMOUS FIRST FLIGHTS THAT CHANGED HISTORY—Lowell Thomas and Lowell Thomas Jr.—Doubleday, 1969, 340 p., 40 photographs, \$6.95. Dramatized accounts of 16 history-making flights, including partial failures such as Latham's first successful landing on water when his plane in 1909 failed to cross the English Channel.

HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY—Ivor Noel Hume—Knopf, 1969, 367 p., photographs, drawings, \$10. A comprehensive guide for both amateurs and student archaeologists to the techniques and methods of excavating historical sites, keeping the records, and treating and storing the discovered artifacts for future preservation.

HUMAN MIGRATION—J. J. Mangalam—Univ. of Kentucky Press, 1968, 194 p., \$15. A bibliography on the literature of migration that appeared in English from 1955 through 1962, including abstracts and conclusions of nearly 400 major articles.

IN PURSUIT OF THE MOUS, THE SNAILE AND THE CLAMM: A Roving Dictionary of the Animal Kingdom—Mary Durant—Meredith Press, 1969, 247 p., illus. by Victoria Chess, \$4.95, Alphabetically arranged, the book takes the reader on an informative tour of the animal world, explaining derivations and origins of about 300 animal names.

INSTANT WEATHER FORECASTING—Alan Watts—Dodd, 1968, 64 p., 24 color photographs, map, \$3,75. Photographic guide with charts and explanations, an aid to weather forecasting from the clouds, for use by farmers, fishermen, yachtsmen and vacationers.

AN INTRODUCTION TO OPERATIONS RE-SEARCH—Patrick Rivett— Basic Bks., 1969, 206 p., diagrams, 55.95. Keeping professional jargon to a minimum, the book outlines the reasons for the operations research approach which the scientist takes to decision-making problems, and why he does not accept that intuition and ex-perience are valid guides.

KILNS: Design, Construction and Operation—Daniel Rhodes—Chilton Bk Co., 1969, 240 p., photographs, diagrams, \$10. Intended to bring together information from widely scattered sources in a form useful to ceramists, the book describes up-draft kilns, downdraft, wood fired and chamber kilns, electric kilns, portable and raku kilns, together with their advantages and limitations.

A MANUAL OF STYLE: For Authors, Editors and Copywriters—Univ. of Chicago Press, 1969 12th ed., 546 p., \$10; until 6/30/69, \$7.50. Updated and revised edition of standard working tool of editors, typographers, proofreaders and printers.

MEN MET ALONG THE TRAIL: Adventures in Archaeology—Neil M. Judd—Univ. of Okla. Press, 1968, 162 p., photographs, \$5. Follows some of the developments in archaeology through the 50 years of the author's experience.

THE PROTECTION OF LITERARY PROPERTY—Philip Wittenberg—The Writer, 1968, 267 p., \$7.95. Brings together essential information for understanding legal problems in the protection of literary property, a reference work for lawyers, literary agents, publishers and editors.

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
