A cross compound 800megawatt (300/500) turbine is in operation, an 800-megawatt single shaft unit is under construction, and a 1,000megawatt unit is being developed.

While steam turbines may not share the glamor of gas turbines, they do have the crucial feature of being able to use any high-temperature heat source whatsoever, thus ensuring their presence for some time to come.


