THE AMERICAN SCHOOL COUNSELOR: A Case Study in the Sociology of Professions—David J. Armor—Russell Sage Foundation, 1969, 227 p., \$7.50. Reports on a comprehensive case study of secondary school counseling as a developing profession. Examination is systematic, empirical and analytical.

BLACK'S MEDICAL DICTIONARY — William A, R. Thomson, M.D.—Barnes & Noble, 1969, 28th ed., 1014 p., 426 illus., \$7. Thoroughly revised and updated, including new sections on chromosomes, dermatoglyphics, perinatal mortality, and rewritten sections on amphetamines, abortion and mongolism.

CELL STRUCTURE AND ITS INTERPRETA-TION: Essays Presented to John Randal Baker—S. M. McGee-Russell and K. F. A. Ross, Eds.—St. Martin's Press, 1969, 433 p., illus., \$25. Collection of essays on a wide variety of cytological topics, two-thirds deal with structures that can be seen by light microscopy, the remaining third with the finer structures revealed at the electron microscope levels of resolution.

CONDENSED COMPUTER ENCYCLOPEDIA—Philip B. Jordain and Michael Breslau—McGraw-Hill, 1969, 605 p., diagrams, \$14.50. Alphabetically arranged and cross-referenced, explains basic entries in layman's terms, while more complex technical entries make fuller use of computer terminology. Entries are developed from basic definition to more advanced concepts, paragraph by paragraph.

DICTIONARY OF RUBBER TECHNOLOGY—Alexander S. Craig—Philosophical Lib., 1969, 228 p., illus., \$15. Up-to-date explanation of the terms employed in rubber technology, rubber science and related polymer and textile technology.

DIRECTORY OF MEDICAL SPECIALISTS holding Certification by American Specialty Boards, Vol. XIII, Including Supplementary Listings and Alphabetical Index—Advisory Board for Medical Specialties—Marquis-Who's Who, 1968, 2366 p., 530. Authorized, up-to-date directory of diplomates certified by the 19 official specialty boards, organized by specialty and arranged geographically, includes the requirements of all boards.

DRUGS FROM A TO Z: A Dictionary—Richard R. Lingeman—McGraw-Hill, 1969, 277 p., \$6.95. A lexicon of terms from the world of drug abuse, from "A-bomb" (marijuana-heroin mixture smoked in a cigarette) to "conked" (highly intoxicated from a drug). Three separate appendices list nonsynthetic derivatives of opium, morphine and cocaine, generic names of synthetic opiates, and generic and trade names of barbiturates, amphetamine and combination drugs.

THE ELEMENTARY STRUCTURES OF KINSHIP (Les Structure élémentaires de la Parenté)—Claude Lévi-Strauss, rev. ed. transl. from French by James Harle Bell, John Richard von Sturmer and Rodney Needham, Ed.—Beacon Press, 1969, 541 p., diagrams, \$15. Authoritative translation of work first published in 1949, a major investigation of the structure of kinship systems based on what sociologists usually call preferential marriage.

FAMOUS PROBLEMS OF MATHEMATICS: A History of Constructions with Straight Edge and Compasses—Benjamin Bold—Van Nostrand, 1969, 112 p., diagrams, \$4.95. Discusses a set of problems and their solutions, connected with such longstanding puzzlers as the Delian problem, trisecting an angle, squaring the circle, and constructing regular polygons.

Study prepared for the Office of Science and Technology, shows distribution of \$2.3 billion in Federal funds in support of academic science activities by agency, institution, and geographic division and state.

FERTILITY AND FAMILY PLANNING: A World View—S. J. Behrman, M.D., Leslie Corsa, Jr., M.D. and Ronald Freedman, Eds.—Univ. of Mich. Press, 1969, 503 p., graphs, \$12.50. Analyses of data on modern fertility trends, their causes and consequences, biological aspects of fertility control, recent trends in public programs for family planning, needed priorities and outlook for the next decade.

FUNDAMENTALS OF ROCK MECHANICS— J. C. Jaeger and N. G. W. Cook—Methuen (Barnes & Noble), 1969, 513 p., diagrams, \$19. Thorough overall treatment of the subject, brings together the results of recent research, emphasizes the mechanical behavior of rocks and those principles of mechanics necessary for the rational interpretation of this behavior. Extensive bibliography is included.
