Clinical psychologist explains in plain language the Action Approach as a way of dealing with pre-paranoid tendencies by recognizing how our feelings are dependent on our action and can be modified by changing that action.

AGHVOOK, WHITE ESKIMO: Otto Geist and Alaskan Archaeology—Charles J. Keim, foreword by Olaus J. Murie—Univ. of Alaska Press (Univ. of Wash. Press), 1969, 313 p., 77 photographs, \$7.95. Biography, based on journal and field notes, gives insight into living patterns of Eskimos, their ceremonies and customs, and describes the excavations at Kukulik mound.

An atlas particularly useful to social scientists, combines exceptionally clear cartography of detailed physical maps and thematic maps depicting worldwide socio-economic data with statistical information. More than 46,000 place names are indexed.

AIR TRANSPORTATION 1975 AND BEYOND, A SYSTEMS APPROACH: Report of the Transportation Workshop, 1967—Bernard A. Schriever and William W. Seifert, Co-Chmn.—M.I.T. Press, 1968, 516 p., illus., \$20. Panel discussion of such specific areas as the potential impact of socioeconomic trends, the new technologies and design trends, airports and terminals, and collection and distribution of passengers and air freight.

AGING AND SOCIETY, Vol. 1: An Inventory of Research Findings—Matilda White Riley and Anne Foner with others—Russell Sage Foundation, 1968, 636 p., diagrams, \$25. A reference work of selected, condensed and organized social science findings on men and women in their middle and later years.
