Contains wide range of contributions from both laboratory research and veterinarians engaged in general practice or applied research. Analyses of the factors contributing to behavioral disturbances in animals include diagnosis, recognition of etiological factors, possible prognosis and treatment. treatment.

ADVANCED HEAT TRANSFER—B. T. Chao, Ed.—Univ. of Ill. Press, 1969, 459 p., \$12.50. Collection of revised lecture notes ranging from discussion of convective and radiative heat transfer, numerical methods, critical two-phase flow to heat transfer in bioengineering and other tonics

APOLLO ON THE MOON—Henry S. F. Cooper, Jr.—Dial Press, 1969, 144 p., \$4.50. Book deals with the procedures that the astronauts will follow during their first visits on the moon, their plans for landing, working and exploring.

Develops, in broad outlines, a philosophy of the nature of life and evolution which is based upon recently acquired knowledge about living matter at the molecular level as well as on observations and experiments over the past 40 years.

BRAIN, MIND AND COMPUTERS—Stanley L. Jaki—Herder & Herder, 1969, 267 p., \$7.50. Deals with the relation between the human mind and the computer, reviews the major steps of computer development and relevant results in brain research, psychology, symbolic logic and linguistics.

BUNJIL'S CAVE: Myths, Legends and Superstitions of the Aborigines of South-East Australia—Aldo Massola—Lansdowne (Humanities Press), 1969, 208 p., photographs, illus., maps, \$10. Lists locations and shows that Aboriginal folklore was connected both with the behavior of animals and with the natural features and configurations of the land.

CELLULAR IMMUNOLOGY, Books One & Two—Sir F. Macfarlane Burnet—Cambridge Univ. Press, 1969, 726 p., illus., \$18.50. Describes immune action in terms of a Darwinian process of inheritable change and selection by proliferation and death among the mobile cells of the mammalian body. The second part of the book is for the research worker and specialist, citing all the documentary evidence for the clonal selection theory as outlined in Book One. See also: SELF AND NOT SELF.

THE CHALLENGE OF CLIMATE: Man and His Environment—Robert Silverberg—Meredith Press, 1969, 326 p., \$5.95. Cites examples from history, drawing on the latest archaelogical findings, to illustrate the effect of climate on civilizations and cultural development, including discussion of climatic shifts in the New World.

COASTS—E. C. F. Bird—M.I.T. Press, 1969, 246 p., 34 photographs, 95 drawings, \$7.50. Designed to provide an up-to-date account of coastal geomorphology, drawing examples from various parts of the world, describes cliffs, beaches, dunes, lagoons, deltas, estuaries and other changing land-forms bordering the sea.

Chronology of cybernetics and survey of the present state of achievement in the creation of artistic forms through digital computer use, shows engineers moving from problem solving to aesthetic exploration.

CYBERNETICS—John F. Young—Am. Elsevier Pub. Co., 1969, 139 p., illus., \$6. The author treats cybernetics as a whole field of research at the border of many disciplines, reviews the vast amount of recent work on various aspects of cybernetics, without mathematics or jargon, and considers present controversies and future possibilities.


