Cider Mill Turns Out Juice While You Wait

➤ A CIDER MILL for the roadside stand grinds up apples and turns out the juice while the patron stands by awaiting his glass of beverage. It can be used for other fruits. It is a quick-acting device which separates the juice from the pulp by centrifugal action.

Patent 2,567,371 was awarded for it to Lyonal D. Forkey, Norwell, John T. Peterson, Melrose, and Henry I. Morton of Needham, Mass.
