REFLECTING GLOVE for the automobile driver, recently patented, aids following drivers to see hand signals at night. It is of conventional appearance and made of conventional materials but has a coating on the rear side that is highly reflective and completely flexible.

TIE CASE, designed to keep neckties pressed, clean and free from dust while traveling, has two panel-rack tie carriers, one fitting in the bottom of the case, the other in the cover. Each holds four ties by means of slots into which the neckband portions are placed.

SOUND-ABSORBING BAFFLES, designed to hang from wires stretched near the ceiling in a factory, are made of glass fiber enclosed in a plastic film. They are intended for rooms where standard acoustic ceiling is difficult to install because of ceiling fixtures.

LOUDSPEAKER, EMPLOYING an electronic principle, has no conventional diaphragm but utilizes a platinum electrode heated to a high temperature. The heated electrode produces an ionic cloud which responds to changes in the strength of a high frequency electric field to produce sound waves.


U. S. population has increased roughly sixfold in one century.

SAND PACKER for treating foundation materials for roads and airports, to replace heavy rollers now used, is called a vibration compactor and weighs only 6.6 tons. Forces applied at the surface by a vibrating steel plate shake the foundation sand and move its constituent particles together.
