

RADIANT HEAT-AIR conditioning unit has been developed which is said to be ideal for new-room additions to houses.



Using a 15-pound, electro-thermal glass panel, the device warms the room in cold weather. Its thermostat switches it to air conditioning on hot summer days. It can be mounted in the wall or in a window, as shown in the photograph.
