ASTM STANDARDS ON TEXTILE MATERIALS: With Related Information—ASTM Committee D-13 on Textile Materials—American Society for Testing Materials, Nov. 1956 ed., 810 p., illus., paper, \$6.25. Of the 126 standards and tentatives, 21 are new and 8 were revised since the previous edition.

ARCHAEOLOGY OF THE FUNERAL MOUND OC-MULGEE NATIONAL MONUMENT, GEORGIA — Charles H. Fairbanks, introduction by Frank M. Setzler—Govt. Printing Office, National Park Service, Archaeological Research Series Number Three, 95 p., illus., paper, \$1.00. Describing the finds made at what is now Ocmulgee National Monument and reconstructing the manner of life of the prehistoric peoples of Georgia.

DAHLAK—Gianni Roghi and Francesco Baschieri, translated from the Italian by Priscilla Hastings. edited by Eleanor Brockett—Essential Books, 280 p., illus., \$6.00. Story of the Italian expedition to the Archipelago of Dahlak and beneath the waters of the Red Sea.

ELECTRONIC COMPUTERS: Principles and Applications—T. E. Ivall, Ed.—Philosophical Library, 167 p., illus., \$10.00. A non-mathematical introduction. Both digital and analog computers are covered. The book is of British origin.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL CARE IN DISASTERS: A Summary of Recorded Experience—John W. Raker, Anthony F. C. Wallace and Jeannette F. Rayner with the collaboration of Anthony W. Eckert—National Academy of Sciences—National Research Council. Publication No. 457, Disaster Study Number 6, 75 p., paper, \$1.50 Emergency medical care, the chairman points out, involves more than medical and hospital personnel; it is a total community responsibility.

Engineering Structural Failures: The Causes and Results of Failure in Modern Structures of Various Types—Rolt Hammond with a foreword by Sir Bruce White—Philosophical Library, 224 p., illus., \$12.00. A study of how accidents happen and the lessons they help to teach.

FOOD CONSUMPTION OF HOUSEHOLDS IN THE UNITER STATES — Faith Clark, Janet Murray and Ennis C. Blake and others—Govt. Printing Office, USDA Household Food Consumption Survey 1955, Report No. 1, 196 p., paper, \$1.25. The new convenience food products were found to have gained a place in the typical American household but so far have not caught up with the more conventional items.

Sharabi—Georgetown University, (American Council of Learned Societies) 113 p., illus., paper, \$1.50. Interesting background material for understanding this trouble spot and the outside influences that bear upon it.

THE HERPETOLOGY OF SINAI—Karl P. Schmidt and Hymen Marx—Chicago Natural History Museum, Fieldiana: Zoology, Volume 39, No. 4, 20 p., illus., paper, 40 cents. The animal life of the Sinai Peninsula is interesting because it is a connecting link between southwest Asia and northeast Africa and because, despite the long history of the region, its fauna is not yet adequately known.

MINERALS YEARBOOK 1953: Volume I, Metals and Minerals (Except Fuels)—Staff, Bureau of Mines, Division of Minerals—Gout. Printing Office, 1373 p., illus., \$4.50. Based largely upon information obtained from mineral producers, processors and users.

THE MODIFICATION OF SOCIAL RESPONSIVENESS IN INSTITUTIONAL BABLES—Harriet Lange Rheingold—Child Development Publication, Monographs of the Society for Research in Child Development, Volume XXI, No. 2, 1956, 48 p., illus., paper, \$1.75. Controlled experiments showed an increase in social responsiveness of infants who have been "mothered" by a single individual and this friendliness was demonstrated not only toward the "mother" but to others.

On Human Communication: A Review, A Survey and a Criticism—Colin Cherry—Technology Press, MIT and Wiley, 333 p., illus., \$6.75. A book of simple essays written to serve as an introduction for the general reader to a series of volumes on communication which will appear during the next few years. Includes chapters on language, signals and statistical theory.

THE ORIGIN OF THE DOG—Edwin H. Colbert—American Museum of Natural History, 14 p., illus., paper, 55 cents. Tracing the ancestry of man's best friend back some 40,000,000 years. An illustrated table is included which shows "One Hundred Aristocrats of the Dog World."

OUR ENDANGERED WILDLIFE — Robert F. Cooney and others—National Wildlife Federation, 31 p., illus., paper, 15 cents. Describing some of our rare and disappearing wild creatures and telling what must be done to save them from extinction.

THE PATIENT SPEAKS: Mother Story Verbatim in Psychoanalysis of Allergic Illness—Harold A. Abramson—Vantage, 239 p., \$3.50. Revealing the psychological treatment of allergy from which more than 5,000,000 people are now suffering. Technical terms and procedures have been eliminated for smoother reading by the layman.

This meeting was held under the auspices of the Agricultural Board and the Agricultural Research Institute in October 1955.

PROTECTING OUR LIVING WATERS—National Wildlife Federation, 16 p., illus., paper, 10 cents. What communities can do to protect their precious water supply.

QUANTUM CHEMISTRY: An Introduction—Walter Kauzmann—Academic, 744 p., illus., \$12.00. More space than usual is devoted to discussions of the nature and seriousness of the mathematical approximations one needs to use in solving many quantum chemical problems.

REPORT ON OILY SUBSTANCES AND THEIR EFFECTS ON THE BENEFICIAL USES OF WATER—Jack Edward McKee—State Water Pollution Control Board (California State Printipg Div.), 72 p., illus., paper, \$1.25. In addition to giving water an "extremely unpalatable taste," oily substances may have a bad effect on fish and wild birds.

SEMINOLE MUSIC—Frances Densmore—Govt. Printing Office, Bureau of American Ethnology Bulletin 161, 223 p., illus., paper, \$1.00. This report records not only the music but also the customs, traditions and ways of life of these very reticent people.

SHIPS IN THE SKY: The Story of the Great Dirigibles—John Toland—Holt, 352 p., illus., \$4.95. The story of the Hindenburg disaster is a feature of the book.

Table of the Fresnel Integral to Six Decimal Places—T. Pearcey, Compiler—Cambridge University Press, 63 p., \$2.50. For reference use by physicists and mathematicians.

VASTNESS OF THE SEA: Adventure in the Mysterious Depths—Bernard Gorsky, translated from the French by Alec Brown—Little, Brown, 305 p., illus., \$5.00. The story of four men who explored the ocean depths with cameras and spears.

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
