## Nylon Oil "Sausages" May Replace Tankers

➤ MIDDLE EAST oil may be towed to Britain in giant "sausage skins" holding 9,000 tons when the Government-backed experiments of two Cambridge University engineers are completed.

A four-foot model, filled with methylated spirit, is now being buffeted by homemade waves in tests in a university laboratory. The hope of their developers, William Hawthorne, professor of applied thermodynamics, and Jack Shaw, an electronics lecturer at the University, is that the nylon oil barges, nicknamed Nobs, will solve the current oil tanker shortage.

The plan is to make an inner container of nylon, covered by a plastic skin, one-quarter to one-half-inch thick, at a cost of \$170,000 to \$300,000. The completed "sausage skin" tanker, 60 feet long and weighing 20 tons empty, could then be flown or shipped to the oil port and rolled around a drum.

When full of crude oil, the Nob would be four-fifths submerged and could be towed by a loaded tanker or tug at 10 to 15 knots in normal weather conditions. With a tug at each end, it might be possible to guide one through the Suez Canal.

The inventors are confident that the Nob would just bounce off if it were to hit a rock or dock wall at speed. It would be bulletproof.

Mr. Shaw, an ex-naval lieutenant-commander, said that the first experiment was carried out with a real sausage skin given them by a Cambridge butcher.
