Per capita use of *sugar* in the United States is nearly 100 pounds a year.

American *automobile* and other motor vehicles produced in 1948 are 76,000 less in number than the 5,358,000 built in 1929; greater production for 1949 is promised.

"Sleeperettes" are now available on some of the long-distance, over-night passenger airplanes; they are seats that stretch out nearly flat to permit comfortable sleeping.

Ultrasonic refers to sound waves too high-pitched to be audible by the human ear; supersonic refers to any speeds faster than that of sound, which is about 760 miles an hour at sea level.

Modified air is being used experimentally in refrigerator cars to aid in keeping fruit in good condition during shipment; it is modified by cutting its normal 21% oxygen content to 5% or by adding carbon dioxide.

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
