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SAFETY RECEPTACLES, for use as electric outlets in the home, are safe for children because the current flows only when standard or polarized caps are inserted. It has four insulated rollers within, two of which must be engaged at the same time to energize the unit.

PARACHUTE TESTER, for the U. S. Air Force, whirls a parachute around a 120foot tower at speeds up to 500 miles an hour. DRY - ICE REFRIGERATOR, recently patented, uses both this solid carbon dioxide and water ice, so disposed as to cooperate for efficient and long-lasting cooling effect. It provides isolated users, far from electric lines, with natural ice. There are no drippings from the refrigerator because the melted water ice is refrozen for re-use.

COOKIE CUTTER turns out cookies that look like the top of a birthday cake, with irregular scalloping suggesting home-made icing, and the words "Happy Birthday" on their tops. The cutters are made of colored or transparent plastic.

SHOWER BATH-BRUSH, with nylon bristles twisted into wire to form a curved oval surface, has a thin plastic tube set in the middle of the bristles from which water is sprayed on them and the body. A fivefoot non-kinking white rubber tube connects the brush to the faucet.

RIPPER that fits into the needle bar of any sewing machine is claimed to take out seams as fast as an ordinary needle puts them in. The device is a tiny honed and angled knife-like instrument that separates the weave in fabric without cutting the cloth but slices the taut bobbin stitch.
