

American Indians were using *sunflower* seed as food when the earliest European explorers discovered this country.

Autotrucks, with the latest mine-rescue equipment, have now completely replaced in the continental United States, the old government railroad mine rescue cars which rushed to mining accidents to help save lives.

The Brazilian carnauba palm, whose leaves furnish the valuable carnauba polishing wax, produces fruit for cattle feed, seeds used as a coffee substitute, sap to make wine and vinegar, and lumber impervious to salt water and insects.

Some 50 inches of rainfall a year in parts of the United States is a high average, but the Assam hills in northeast India often have over 50 feet a year due to the moisture-carrying winds from the Indian ocean in the monsoon season.
