

THE ORCHIDS: A Scientific Survey-Carl L. Withner, Ed.—Ronald, 648 p., illus., \$14. Emphasis is on the botanical, rather than horticultural approach to orchids; work covers present scientific literature on the biology of orchids, pointing out areas for future research.

Report of Main Commission, with recommendations on maximum permissible doses for individuals, special groups and general population, and general principles regarding working conditions.



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
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

Abstracts of State legislative action, reflecting national anxiety over the cost of obtaining a college education.

THEORETICAL ELASTICITY—Carl E. Pearson— Harvard Univ. Press, 218 p., \$6. Graduate course discussing modern methods of elasticity theory, thoroughly treating thermo-elasticity, wave motion and non-linear elasticity.

THEORY OF FUNCTIONALS AND OF INTEGRAL AND INTEGRO-DIFFERENTIAL EQUATIONS — Vito Volterra, preface by Griffith C. Evans, biography of Vito Volterra and bibliography of his published works by Sir Edmund Whittaker-Dover, 226 p., paper, \$1.75. Reprint of 1930 English edition with additions.

TREATISE ON INVERTEBRATE PALEONTOLOGY: Part O: Arthropoda 1 (Trilobitomorphs)—Raymond C. Moore, Ed.—Geological Soc. of Am., 560 p., illus., \$10.50.
