## **Dysentery Outbreak**

Overcrowded, dilapidated housing in an area of Omaha, Neb., was blamed for an outbreak of dysentery caused by the bacillus Shigella, called shigellosis.

A total of 87 confirmed cases of this bacillary dysentery occurred during late 1961 and early 1962 in 41 households and a nursing home, a group of public health workers reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 182:1307, 1962.

Most of the cases were concentrated in a 17-by-30-block area known as the near north side, where in some cases 13 to 17 persons lived in five rooms. Because of the large number of food handlers and other service workers in this part of the community, the infection was a potential hazard to the entire city.

Because of the generally high level of housing and sanitation in the United States, large community outbreaks have not been reported recently, and a Journal editorial in the same issue urged renewed efforts to improve environmental conditions.

Dr. Wiley H. Mosley, Kansas City, Kans., Field Station, Communicable Disease Center, Public Health Service, collaborated with Dr. Edwin D. Lyman and Beatrice Adams, a registered nurse, both with the Omaha-Douglas County Health Department, in the study.

They reported that the infection was not spread from a common source, such as water, but from "person-to-person" and "household-to-household."

## Five Equal Aspirin Compounds

➤ Five non-prescription aspirin compounds showed no significant difference in ability to ease pain, three medical researchers reported in JAMA (p. 1315).

But two of the compounds, Excedrin and Anacin, were associated with a "significantly higher incidence" of upset stomach. The upset was attributed to the drug phenacetin contained only in these two preparations.

No more upset stomach was found with Bayer or St. Joseph's Aspirin than with Bufferin, the researchers said, adding that the difference in retail purchase price of the five drugs is "not reflected in the effectiveness and comfort of the treatment."
