Radioactive lodine for Thyroid Cancer

➤ PATIENTS are still apparently free of thyroid cancer 13 years after surgery and treatment with radioactive iodine, according to a report in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 183: 303, 1963. Follow-up examinations of 152 patients so treated at the University of Michigan showed that 73 had no signs of the disease for an average of five years, which is the most encouraging report so far published. Drs. Thomas P. Haynie, Mohamed M. Nofal and William H. Beierwaltes, who reported the findings, said their best results were with young people.

Pink Pork Danger

Housewives are reminded in an editorial in the current JAMA, 183:365, 1963, that a good cook never sets pink pork on the table if she does not expect her family to get trichinosis. Hog-raisers also are warned about feeding uncooked garbage to their stock, a fact well known.

In spite of cause and prevention being understood, trichinosis continues to occur in this country, especially in the South. Undercooked sausage and home-cured ham may also harbor the parasite *Trichinella spiralis*, which infects pork. Pork should be cooked at least one-half hour to the pound.

Physicians should ask their patients about pink pork, the editorial says, inasmuch as diagnosis is difficult.

Trichinosis can masquerade as an upper respiratory infection, acute nephritis, rheumatic disease, stomach or intestinal disorder, tuberculosis, typhoid fever, primary heart disease or neurologic disease, including meningitis and encephalitis. The successful treatment of trichinosis depends on early diagnosis.

More than 300 cases were reported in the U.S. in 1961, but thousands of cases probably have not been reported.

Computer Consults

Physicians in need of expert medical consultation can now call in a computer. A report in the current JAMA, 183:307, 1963, told of a programmed computer that came up with the same answer as the diagnosing physician in 258 of 268 cases of thyroid condition.

The average physician may see only 10 cases of thyroid disease a year, but with a computer the combined experience of the best qualified diagnosticians can be made readily available. In this study, the computer made its decisions on the basis of relative frequencies of 21 factors in overactive, underactive or normal thyroid cases.

Dr. John E. Overall of the Kansas State University department of psychology, Manhattan, with the KSU computation center's cooperation and that of Dr. Clyde M. Williams of the University of Florida College of Medicine, department of radiology, Gainesville, reported the study.

More Women With Lung Cancer

More women are getting lung cancer than formerly, Dr. Theodore H. Noehren of Buffalo, N. Y., reported in JAMA, 183:398, 1963, Questions and Answers section. The New York State Bureau of Cancer Control indicates that the relative increase between 1942 and 1961 was 124.8% in women and only 72.2% in men, with similar figures available elsewhere in the U.S. Cigarette smoking is commonly associated with bronchogenic carcinoma, the most common type of lung cancer, Dr. Noehren said.
