

Stigma of Leprosy Kept Alive by Writers

➤ CURRENT STORIES, articles and novels are keeping alive the stigma of Hansen's disease, or leprosy, even though patients can now be treated successfully and returned to their homes. An appeal to writers to eliminate such cliches as "He treated me as if I had leprosy," "The man is a moral leper—stay away from him," and the like, has been made by Dr. Ira D. Hirschy of the Department of Health, Honolulu, Hawaii.

These phrases are written without any intent to harm, but they strike a disastrous blow to the morale of former patients who have had the disease, been treated, and then returned home as noninfectious.

Hansen's disease can now be successfully treated with sulfone drugs if it is diagnosed and treated promptly. But all too often former patients meet such ostracism they cannot get a job or be accepted by the community. This happens both to patients discharged from Kalaupapa in Hawaii and from Carville, La.

One type of Hansen's disease is not even infectious, but the patient is shunned as if he were a source of contagion.

The stigma attached to the disease has existed for centuries and is kept alive, in part, by the publication of phrases which link the disease to horror, fear and ostracism.

"Authors have a real opportunity to help simply by avoiding destructive comparisons and by writing of Hansen's disease as it now is, an illness which can be treated," Dr. Hirschy reported.
