## Nature Ramblings A Do You Know?

➤ ALLIGATORS are found only in China and the United States. The American species (Alligator mississippiensis) is confined to the Southeast, from North Carolina to Florida and west to Texas.

The American alligator, the larger species, has been largely restricted to small areas in and around Florida. Hunters killed many, since their skin was, and still is, used in the manufacture of handbags, shoes, and other rugged leather articles. Man's impact on habitat is also responsible for restricting their range.

The 'gator differs from the crocodile only slightly. The fourth lower tusk-like tooth fits into the upper jaw and is not visible when the mouth is closed as in the crocodiles.

The record length of an American alligator is 19 feet two inches, shot in Louisiana. Although the usual size is 11 to 12 feet, they used to grow to an average length of 14 or 15 feet.

The alligator has two predators besides man. The black bear and the raccoon like

the eggs of the alligator and dig them out of the nest-mound made by the reptile. The 'gator deposits 20 to 70 eggs in the mound.

The alligator's diet changes with age, the old alligator choosing larger animals for dinner. Pigs, muskrats, deer and cows are often pulled into the water and eaten by adult alligators.

Today the alligator is protected by law in most areas. A limited number is harvested each year for the hides. Prices vary with length from \$1.25 to \$2.50 per foot.

A computer that possesses total and almost instantaneous "recall" over a huge mass of literary material culled from the works of 74 great writers has been developed.

By the use of electric soil heating cable, nursery stock may now be rooted and grown to salable size in 12 to 24 months less time than previously.

Farm buildings may soon be constructed from low-cost prefabricated concrete panels, light enough to be erected without the aid of construction machinery and strong enough to last at least 20 years.

Chicks gain more weight and consume less feed when housed at a temperature of 75 degrees Fahrenheit than those housed at 49 degrees.
