TIRE STOWAWAY solves tire storage problems for those who have separate sets of tires for winter and summer driving. Consisting of a steel rod shaped into a shell-like frame, it can be mounted on any wall having wooden studs. Each frame of the set of two holds one tire without injury and off the floor.

SCOMPACT ANALOGUE COMPUTER performs a Fourier analysis, normally requiring about one hour, in three minutes, giving the DC offset and magnitudes of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th harmonics of any waveform that can be plotted. Values are read directly from a meter on the portable computer. Designed for desk-top operation, it weighs only 19 pounds.

OPTICAL RADAR SET consists of a laser transmitting and receiving device packaged in a portable suitcase. The extremely accurate device is useful in military applications to zero in on targets such as tanks, and commercially for surveying, where distances can be measured without triangulation. The laser beam is merely aimed on a target and the range read from an indicator.

SCALE-MODEL SKELETON, shown in the photograph, is a valuable aid in the



study of human anatomy. Molded of polyethylene plastic, the skeleton hangs freely from a hook on a stand, with bones ivory colored and cartilage lacquered in blue. An identification diagram is printed on the base of the stand.

ELECTRONIC LIGHT CONTROL will dim, blend or brighten up to 500 watts

of incandescent lighting by turning a dial. Easily installed with a screw driver, the control fits into the wall box for the standard on-off switch. It saves power by using only the electricity needed.

## Do You Know?

➤ OUR NATIONAL SYMBOL, the bald eagle, was challenged by naturalists John Audubon and Benjamin Franklin as to its suitability for such a high honor. The threat of extinction is the regal bird's present adversary.

Alarming decreases in the population of the white-headed bird of prey have forced legislators to consider new courses of preservation for the bird depicted on our coins. The bald eagle, although protected by law, may disappear if its slaughter is not restricted.

Perhaps Franklin and Audubon, who opposed the bird because of its unroyal actions, should have had their way. The bald eagle is a thief and a scavenger. It waits until an unwary osprey catches a fish and then takes the meal away from the smaller bird. It lives on dead creatures and attacks harmless rodents.

Even the mild cheeping whistles of the bird are a disappointment to those expecting a cry worthy of the huge, fierce-looking bird.

But since June 20, 1782, when it was

adopted by our Government, the bald eagle has assumed the responsibility of representing this country. It is protected because, aside from this honor and duty, its poise and beauty, its solitary way of life, the respective size and great power and speed of this great bird demand respect.

The bald eagle is as American as the ice cream sundae. Its heritage is cherished and its existence should be nurtured. It is known and revered by all Americans because it is our national emblem.
