

## **Red-Eyed Vireo**

➤ A NEW GENERATION of red-eyed vireos (Vireo olivaceus) joins the multitude of young birds being hatched in the nation's woodlands, fields and marshes this spring. Their hungry chirps announce their arrival.

An intricately constructed, basket-like nest hanging in a tree fork will protect the chicks less than two weeks. They then join the adults in search of insects and larvae among the leaves.

The down of these young changes quickly to olive-green on the back, white on the chest and a gray cap, marked with a white eyebrow stripe. Their eyes change from brown to the characteristic red in the first few weeks.

The "Preacher" is well-known for its long, monotonous chant, tirelessly sung from dawn to dark in a loud, nasal tone. It is repeated as often as 40 times a minute, and reminds one of the Oriental cuckoos.

More than 40 species of vireos inhabit the Americas, from the tip of South America to Alaska and Canada. The vireos are protectively colored and build strong nests, often used by the lazy cowbird who leaves her eggs for others to care for.

The vireos are among the few birds whose scientific name has been accepted for their common name.

Although the tropics are more populated by the vireo family, the red-eyed vireo can be found wherever there are trees in any number, whether in parks, along roads, or in deep woodlands.
