New Penicillin Test Found Safe

➤ A SKIN TEST that detects penicillin sensitivity simply and causes no serious reaction itself has been developed and looks promising.

The new test was given to 16,239 medical patients. Those who showed no allergy to penicillin did not develop life-threatening reactions when later given the antibiotic. However, the test was not 100% accurate in determining what persons were allergic to penicillin.

Medical researchers who reported the new test said they believe it is the best penicillin sensitivity check at this time, and the most promising for future investigation.

The test is given by injecting into the skin a solution of penicillolyl-polylysine, a compound that does not provoke an allergic reaction. The test is considered positive if the blister that is raised enlarges or if red appears around it. No allergy to penicillin is indicated if the blister does not change.

Dr. Bobby C. Brown, Dr. M. Brittain Moore Jr. and Eleanor V. Price, all of the Communicable Disease Center, U.S. Public Health Service, Atlanta, reported the test in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 189:599, 1964.

Weather Affects Gland Activity

The adrenal gland, situated at the upper pole of the kidney, is apparently affected by the weather, a Japanese medical researcher has found.

Dr. Gen-Ichi Watanabe, University of Niigata School of Medi-

cine, Niigata, Japan, who conducted a study of both men and women in Niigata City, said the adrenal gland cortex seemed more active in winter than at any other time. It appeared least active during fall and spring.

Dr. Watanabe said this makes it reasonable to assume that seasonal changes occur in the body although there is not enough evidence now to prove this. In a place of sudden temperature changes, like Niigata City where the study was made, climatic stress may activate the adrenal cortex, he said.

Dr. Watanabe reported his study in the Archives of Environmental Health, 9:192, 1964.

Drugs Aid Eyes in Old Age

Four drugs can improve sharpness of sight, which usually wanes with age, a study indicates.

The study, which took 13 years to complete, was made on elderly hospital patients who had a variety of eye disorders. The drugs used were nicotine acid, Roniacol, Priscoline and Arlidin.

Dr. H. Wyatt Laws, ophthalmologist-in-chief of Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Montreal, said Arlidin, available only with a physician's prescription, was the most effective of the drugs.

Of 203 patients examined, the eyesight of 87% either improved or remained the same with the treatment. Elderly patients with eye ailments who did not want the treatment showed continued eye failure.

Dr. Laws reported his findings in the Canadian Medical Association Journal, 91:325, 1964.
