**Birth to Maturity:** A Study in Psychological Development — Jerome Kagan and Howard A. Moss. This book, originally published in 1962, emphasizes the relationship between early experiences and adult characteristics. In a new preface one of the authors, Kagan, explains the way in which recent findings in this field have led him to modify his original theory and why the original study remains a valuable resource. **Distant Encounters:** The Exploration of Jupiter and Saturn — Mark Washburn. Captures the excitement and the spirit of this adventure — "one of the most awe-inspiring enterprises in all of history." A summary of pre-Voyager planetary astronomy is given so that the scope of the Voyagers' findings can be fully appreciated. Presents for the general reader the Voyagers' discoveries in lucid text and photographs in a way to make the reader feel a part of this great endeavor. 
**Geo-Data:** The World Almanac Gazetteer — George Thomas Kurian, Ed. Arranged in four major parts: the United States; World Countries, Cities and Administrative Divisions; Geographical Gazetteer of the World; and Rankings. Concentrates on data that are not easy to find elsewhere, without excluding material essential in a gazetteer of this scope. Gale, 1983, 623 p., \$48.

Margaret Mead and Samoa: The Making and Unmaking of an Anthropological Myth — Derek Freeman. On the basis of years of field work and historical research, Freeman refutes Mead's characterization of Samoan society and adolescence in *Coming of Age in Samoa*. The relaxed transition to adulthood that Mead portrayed is quite different from the Samoan adolescence observed by Freeman. He delves into the possible reasons for Mead's way of interpreting her data and the nature-nurture debate that raged in the 1920s. Harvard U Pr, 1983, 379 p., illus., \$20.

The Myth of Masculinity — Joseph H. Pleck. Analyzes the male sex role identity, a set of ideas about sex roles, especially the male role, that has dominated the academic social sciences since the 1930s and more generally has shaped our culture's view of the male role. Originally published in hardback in 1981. MIT Pr, 1983, 229 p., paper, \$6.95.

The New High Ground: Systems and Weapons of Space Age War — Thomas Karas. Provides an overview of present military uses of space for communications, intelligence, navigation and weather-watching. Explores the expanding role of the American military-industrial complex in space, details the current extension of the military use of space to the "weaponization" of space and relates the growing arms race in space to the danger of nuclear war. S&S, 1983, 224 p., illus., \$14.95.

**Understanding Women:** A Feminist Psychoanalytic Approach — Luise Eichenbaum and Susie Orbach. Articulates a new psychological theory of women based on feminist principles and points up the implications of this for the practice of feminist psychotherapy. Basic, 1983, 212 p., \$15.50.



When the first edition of **The Dinosaur Dictionary** appeared in 1972, it was named one of the best reference books of the year by the American Library Association.

In the years that have elapsed since then, there have been tremendous advances in the study of dinosaurs, making older books on the subject obsolete. In the words of Bob Long of the University of California's paleontology department, we are entering a new Golden Age of Dinosaurs. More new dinosaurs are being discovered than at any time since the first Golden Age back in the nineteenth century, and there have been many reclassifications. Some specimens once thought to be dinosaurs have now been shorn of that designation.

Donald F. Glut, now a member of the Society of Vertebrate Paleontology, based the first edition of this book entirely on his own careful research of the field. As a result of its success, he has been deluged with advice and new information from all over the world — from the best "dinosaur men" in the field.

The New Dinosaur Dictionary is exactly what its name implies. It is an alphabetical listing of every genus of dinosaur now known to paleontologists. It contains more than six hundred illustrations — drawings, paintings and photographs of skeletons and reconstructions. Many of the pictures have been prepared especially for this book by well-known dinosaur illustrators, including 25 by William Stout.

It is by far the most comprehensive and up-to-date book on the subject of dinosaurs.
